20th Sunday: The Prince of Peace

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6)

Prophet Isaiah foretold about the birth of Jesus and gave him these names to highlight his divine nature and his reign of peace. The Hebrew phrase "Shar Shalom" means "the one who removes all peace-disturbing factors and secures the peace," emphasizing Jesus' role in bringing about true peace.

The statement made by Jesus in the gospel, seems to contrast with the above prophecy of Isaiah – that Jesus is a Prince of Peace.Of course, Jesus shouldn't have said that he came 'to kindle a fire upon the earth' (Luke 12:49). This is definitely not a statement expected from Prince of Peace.

All we should bear in mind is that this assertion made by Jesus is a metaphor. Fire burns up what is useless, and refines what is impure. A fire needs not only to be kindled but also tended to achieve the desired result. The gospel is a fire that purifies; it is the leaven of society and the world.

In the early days of the Church, conversion to Christianity was most likely to lead to rejection of new converts by their families, or become outcast of the society. Hence, a new convert had to make a choice between Jesus, their family and the society. This is the division Jesus was alluding to.

As I mentioned earlier, when Jesus talked about bringing fire and division his words are not meant to be taken literally. Yet those words stand for something real in him. Jesus was gentle; but this doesn't mean that he was weak. When the occasion demanded it, he could be very assertive:

- As when he drove the traders out of the Temple (Matthew 21:12).
- When James and John wanted him to call down fire and brimstone on a Samaritan village, he told them they didn't know what they were talking about (Luke 9:54).
- And when Peter drew his sword in the garden, Jesus told him to put it away (John 18:10).

No doubt, Jesus' strong teachings caused division. He taught that the Kingdom of God was open to everyone - saints and sinners, Jews and Gentiles. This is in contrast with Pharisaic teachings, which hold that heaven is meant for the Jews alone (traditionalists). For this reason, Jesus called the Scribes and Pharisees hypocrites and blind guides (Matthew 23: 13-16). This brought him into conflict with the religious establishment of his day.

Today, there is a tendency to reduce the gospel message to 'pretty words and feel-good experiences.' When this happens - the fire has gone out, the Good News has lost its power, the salt has lost its taste, the light has grown dim.

If Jesus had flattered people and said only 'nice' things to them, he could have made himself popular but would have ended up watering down the gospel message. No, he chose to disturb people, because they needed to be disturbed. His words shocked some and infuriated others. The words he spoke to the poor were different from those he spoke to the rich. The words he spoke to sinners were different from those he spoke to the Pharisees.

Jesus chose to bring about peace through suffering. His sacrifice on the cross is understood as the means by which humanity can be reconciled with God and achieve peace with him. Jesus offers peace within individuals, a peace that surpasses understanding and helps believers to overcome fear and anxiety.

21st Sunday: Narrow Door

God is revealed to us as a spirit, all-wise, all-powerful, eternal and omnipresent-existing everywhere. "God is a Spirit," saidJesus, "and they that adore him, must adore him in spirit and in truth" (John 4:24). God is present everywhere in three ways: by his essence, by his knowledge and by his superintending power.

"Just as the soul pervades the body and is necessary for every movement I make, so God's concurring power is necessary for every deed I do, for every word I utter, and for every thought I think", said John O'Brien. For this reason, he would always want us home – heaven.

The kingdom of God is present and the door open. But the door is not so wide that people can saunter casually in at their own convenience; it is a narrow opening through which they must thrust themselves with determination. Besides, the door will not be open indefinitely; our individual doors will close at the moment of death.

There was a story about the man who died and went up to heaven. St. Peter met him at the gate, brought him inside, and took him on a tour of paradise. At a certain point they came to an enclosure surrounded by a high wall. As they were passing it Peter said, 'Keep very quiet as you pass this place.'

'Why?' the man asked.

'In case we might disturb those inside, Peter answered.

'Who's inside?' he asked.

'Jews'. You see, they think they're the only people in heaven. If they thought there were others in heaven, they'd be very disappointed. In fact, some of them would probably ask for their money back."

The man who asked Jesus, 'Will only a few be saved? (Luke 13:23)' obviously thought that heaven was a select club to which only members are admitted. The man was a Jew. As such he would have believed that only Jews would be admitted to the Kingdom of Heaven. Gentiles had no hope of getting in. The idea of a chosen people is a dangerous idea. If God chooses a people, he doesn't choose them to the exclusion of others, but to the service of others.

Further, Jesus said, "The first will be last, and the last will be first.' It was a revolutionary statement that shocked and outraged the Pharisees. The Pharisees saw this as a betrayal of virtuous people like themselves.

Jesus came and announced the good news of the coming of the Kingdom of God. To those who thought they could enter the kingdom on privileges (baptized). He said, produce the fruits of repentance, otherwise your privileged position would benefit you nothing.

In the gospel Jesus made it clear that conversion was a necessary disposition for entry into the kingdom. And he succeeded in bringing it about in the most unlikely of people. Many sinners heeded his call to conversion, and made their way into the kingdom.

The church teaches that salvation is not something we can earn. It is a gift of God (CCC: 169). But that doesn't mean we ought not try to make ourselves worthy of it. Through our baptism we are members of the new Chosen People. But we must not rely on that fact alone. We must endeavour to produce the fruits of the kingdom, namely - is love, joy, peace, for bearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5: 22-23).
