January is the Month of the Holy Name of Jesus

The month of January is traditionally dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus. After the Blessed Virgin Mary conceived by the Holy Spirit, the angel Gabriel appeared to St. Joseph and told him that the Child's name should be called Jesus, meaning "God Saves." According to Jewish law, on the 8th day after his birth a male child was to be circumcised, receive his name, and become a full member of God's covenant people. According to the old Roman liturgical calendar, the Feast of the Circumcision of Jesus was celebrated on January 1st, eight days after Christmas, the same day that He was given His sacred name. Currently we celebrate the Solemnity of the Mother of God on January 1st and honor the Holy Name of Jesus on January 3rd. For Catholics, Jesus' sacred name is the object of a special devotion symbolized by the monogram "IHS," (sometimes called a Christogram), which is the first three letters of the Greek spelling of His name.

Synod Implementation in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon was recently launched by Bishop Hagemoen. "The Church's vocation and prophetic service (Lumen Gentium Dogmatic Constitution on the Church LG 12) consists in witnessing to God's plan to unite all humanity to Himself in freedom and communion. The Church is 'the Kingdom of Christ already present in mystery' (LG 3) and 'the seed and the beginning of the Kingdom on earth' (LG 5). It, therefore, walks together with all humanity, strongly committed to justice and peace, human dignity, and the common good. All this, while it 'aspires after the completion of the kingdom' (LG 5) when God will be 'all in all.' Diocesan Prayer

We pray as a diocesan family for a spirit of humble worship: may all of us bring everything that we are to adore Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, sharing in the devotion of the Magi who came to adore Him, bringing their gifts.

Epiphany: Shepherd – Magi visit

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem village, a band of scholars (Kings) arrived in Jerusalem from the East. They asked around, “Where can we find and pay homage to the newborn King of the Jews? We observed a star in the eastern sky that signaled his birth.” The Magi actually were on pilgrimage to worship Jesus.

The news of the birth of Jesus Christ cut across social classes, touched the poorest (*shepherds*), drew the wealthiest (*Magi*), and involved beings of another realm (*angels*). What this revealed is how universal and all-inclusive the gospel is.

The Poorest: Shepherds sat on the lowest rung of the social ladder. They were considered uncouth, uneducated, uncultured, and they were poorly paid. Few considered shepherds more important than the sheep they tended. Socially despised, and outside the world of religious respectability, they were simple people with simple tasks. But it was to them that the message of Jesus’ birth was first given.

With the birth of Jesus, the outcasts had become insiders. The ignored had become the first to hear of Jesus’ birth. Word went not to the powerful, the influential, or the rich. It went to shepherds. On receiving the good news, they wasted no time walking to Bethlehem and searching for the baby. Once there, they told Mary and Joseph of the angelic message, something the Bible says Mary treasured and pondered in her heart (cf. Luke 2:19).

The angel’s message -“Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you, he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger”(Luke 2:12).

Angels remain a mystery to us. Although there are approximately three hundred references to these beings in the bible, we know very little about them. But what we do know is that they are servants of God who act as messengers. In fact, the word angel means ‘messenger’, ἀγγελος in Greek.

The Wealthiest: the Magi from the East came to welcome the new King. The wise men were the intellectuals of the day, and in their land they were considered kingmakers. When they found Jesus, Mary and Joseph; these wealthy, powerful, intellectuals bowed down and worshipped Jesus.

They brought gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

- Gold was a gift for a king.
- Frankincense was used in religious worship and therefore was a gift for a priest.
- Myrrh was used to embalm the dead and foreshadowed the death of Jesus.

God used angels to deliver the first complete gospel message. He used shepherds to prove that the message was for everyone of every class. He used the wise men to show that Jesus' ministry was global, reaching beyond the borders of his land and into Gentile territory. The message of Jesus is meant for every heart – for you and me.

If Christmas is all about God coming to us to seek us out, then Epiphany is all about our seeking out God who has come among us. The Wise Men offer us great wisdom. They give us a gift that is priceless. They followed the star (light) and found Jesus. We should be prepared to follow the light this year.

Like the wise men, each of us has a journey to make to Jesus because none of us is perfect and each of us has corners in our hearts and lives in need of Jesus' healing and redemption.
